Speaking of sports, I'd like to give a special shout out to the Muskego High School Girls Tennis, Girls Volleyball, and Boys Football teams. The Girls Tennis team is headed to the WIAA State Tournament, while Girls Volleyball Regionals is underway and the Boys Football team takes on Milwaukee Pulaski/Reagan in round one of the playoffs tonight. Best of luck Warriors, I hope I didn't miss anyone! Meanwhile, I'm still stuck in September, so let's get started.

September 20th:

- 2:39 a.m. – A 47 year old resident of the W12900 block of Harry Vardon Ct. called the police department to report her 22 year old daughter was supposed to be home by midnight and was not answering her phone.
