August 28th, 2020 – September 3rd, 2020

Man, it feels good to be caught up! Well, sort of...there's still a few weeks from the beginning of the year I've yet to get to. All in good time. It's Friday, though and the beautiful start of a three day weekend! What are everyone's plans? The wife and I are headed to her grandmother's so she can meet her newest granddaughter for the first time. My hope for you is that you are able to spend some time with family and friends, relaxing, and taking a break from this chaotic place we call earth. I'm hesitant to mention that the first Friday of September (today) is recognized nationally as "Lazy Mom's Day". WAIT! It's not what you think! First and foremost, I'm not sure such a thing exists, at least not in my household. Second, it's not a dig on mom's, but rather a call to show mom some extra love and attention by giving her a well-deserved break from the daily grind, much like Mother's Day. Actually, just like Mother's Day. In reality we should be doing this at LEAST once a month if not more. Either way, coupled with the holiday weekend, she shouldn't be lifting a finger! Having that said, on to the week's events!

August 28th:

- 9:49 a.m. – Just another reminder, the police department serves as an internet purchase exchange location and is under surveillance 24/7. Having that said, a 39 year old resident of the W13000 block of Camilla Drive called the police department to report selling two items to two separate parties on Facebook Marketplace. She indicated placing both items on her porch so the parties could pick them up at their convenience, however when one party responded, they took both items. The complainant made contact with a 38 year old Milwaukee resident who admitted to taking both items and stated they would return the item they were not supposed to take, however then blocked our complainant from further communicating with them. An officer was summoned, contacted the Milwaukee subject, and informed them that should they not return the items, they would be charged with theft. The subject responded to the police department the following day and paid for the additional items as they no longer had all of them in their possession. - 10:40 a.m. – A 61 year old resident of the S7000 block of Cornell Circle responded to the police department to report a child being left alone in another unit of her apartment complex. An officer was summoned, and after speaking with the complainant, it was determined that she was unable to decipher who the child was or specifically where they were being left alone. She then also reported witnessing an unknown subject drag a different child from a pickup truck outside her complex on an unknown date and time, as well as having recently spoken with Axl Rose. - 11:06 a.m. – A 60 year old resident of the W17800 block of Martin Drive called the police department to report her mailbox, a no parking sign, and a 25 mph speed limit sign were all struck by the operator of an unknown vehicle that obviously had not stuck around or reported their crash. An officer was summoned to investigate the hit and run. D.P.W. was contacted to replace the damaged signs. Investigation continuing.

- 7:36 p.m. – A 39 year old resident of the S8400 block of Racine Ave. was cited for OAR and failing to install an ignition interlock device in the vehicle he was driving following a traffic stop that occurred near the intersection of Small Rd. and College Ave. He was given a verbal warning for the equipment violation that first drew officers' attention and also advised not to drive.
- 8:31 p.m. – A 20 year old Milwaukee resident was cited for moon cabbage wax possession as well as underage alcohol possession after being pulled over for an expired registration violation near the intersection of Janesville Rd. and Park Drive. He admitted to drinking 1 White Claw prior to leaving his residence, however probable cause to arrest for OWI did not exist. That's just a bad choice all around. The remainder of the case was later located inside the vehicle, seized, and dumped out as it should be. His vehicle was secured and he was released on scene after receiving his paperwork.

August 29th:

- 9:06 a.m. – A 68 year old resident of the S6800 block of Adrian Drive called the police department to report his mailbox was also left lying on the ground after being struck by an unknown subject and vehicle sometime overnight. An officer responded to photograph the damage. Investigation continuing.
- 10:20 a.m. – A 59 year old resident of the W13500 block of Fleetwood Drive called the police department to report observing a teenage male subject in the yard of a residence located in the W13500 block of Hale Park Circle with a German Shepherd. According to our caller, the teen would throw items at the dog anytime it stopped barking and would like the welfare of the dog checked. An officer responded to the residence and made contact with the 13 year old and a female adult at the residence. The dog appeared well taken care of, so they were advised of the complaint.
- 4:19 p.m. – A 52 year old resident of the W17700 block of Orchard Ct. called twice in the same day to report hearing gunshots near his residence. After not locating the source of said gunshots after the first complaint, officers were able to determine there was a parcel of land to the west of our complainant's home where the shots were legally coming from.
- 6:50 p.m. – Officers and T.C.F.D. paramedics responded to the intersection of Muskego Dam Drive and Kelsey Drive for the report of a vehicle vs. tree accident. Luckily no injuries were reported to the driver or her three passengers. The vehicle was removed via a tow and a crash report completed.
- 8:35 p.m. – A U/I complainant called the police department to report hearing fireworks west of the intersection of Monterey Drive and Pasadena Drive. Officers responded and located the suspect residence in the S7800 block of Hillendale Drive. Contact was made with a 42 year old Stallis resident who was made privy to our municipal ordinances and the necessity of a permit.
- 9:04 p.m. – A 31 year old Milwaukee resident was cited for operating a motor vehicle without a valid driver's license and given a verbal warning for the equipment violation he was initially pulled over for near the intersection of Janesville Rd. and Kipling Drive. Also advised not to drive.
- 10:43 p.m. – A resident of the W20100 block of Wood Berry Lane called the police department to report an unknown subject rang her doorbell and upon answering the door, she found a sink and faucet on her front porch. That's a new one. Our caller was adamant an officer respond and investigate, although the only applicable violation I can think of is illegal dumping. August 30th:

- 12:11 a.m. – A 26 year old New Berlin resident was arrested for OWI – 1st Offense, carrying a concealed weapon without a permit, and going armed while intoxicated. The gun was seized and he was transported to an area hospital for a blood draw. Once that was taken care of, it was back to the police department for a photoshoot and fingerprints before being released to his sober buddy.
- 12:28 a.m. – An 18 year old resident of the S9100 block of North Cape Rd. was cited for OAS and advised not to drive after being pulled over at the intersection of Janesville Rd. and Martin Drive.

- 2:53 a.m. – 19 year old resident of the S7400 block of Park Drive called the police department to report a white, male subject he believed to be intoxicated had just attempted entering his house. I'd like to believe on accident. Our caller stated he was armed, good, and the subject had left on foot in an unknown direction. Officers responded and established a perimeter around the area. - 11:30 a.m. – Officers and T.C.F.D. paramedics responded to the intersection of US 45 and Loomis Drive for the report of a two vehicle accident. Once the light turned green, our at fault driver started moving before the vehicle in front of him did. Minor neck/back injuries were reported. An 18 year old resident of the S7500 block of Lannon Drive was cited for following too closely.
- 1:23 p.m. – A 34 year old resident of the W18600 block of Jean Drive called the police department to report being harassed by a subject of whom she only knew their first name. This was the second time she had called to make the same complaint. Previously, officers had to settle for leaving the subject a voicemail. Time to take the next step and get the message across.
- 2:33 p.m. – A 32 year old Waukesha resident called the police department to report a reckless driver operating westbound on Janesville Rd. Our caller claimed the operator of the white BMW cut her off, break checked her, began yelling at her while hanging out the window, then sped down Janesville at approximately 50 mph while weaving in and out of traffic without signaling. Officers responded to the registered owner's residence in the S9000 block of Cardinal Ct. and made contact with the 54 year old operator who of course denied the allegations and shifted blame to the caller. Having previous contacts with the suspect myself, I'm going to side with the complainant on this one, but it's a case of she said/he said, so he was let off with a verbal warning for his behavior.
- 9:49 p.m. – A 76 year old resident of the W17100 block of Briargate Lane called the police department to report her 32 year old grandson who resides with her stole her vehicle. The grandson reportedly took the keys to the vehicle without permission 10 minutes prior to our complainant calling. Some grandson, and this is not the first time we have received this complainant involving the pair. The vehicle was entered into the database as stolen until 12:15 a.m. the following morning when officers observed the vehicle outside the residence. Contact was made with the owner who did not wish to press charges...again. Then why call and say it was stolen?
- 9:52 p.m. – Multiple calls to the police department were received reference a large amount of cattle in the roadway near the intersection of Tess Corners Drive and College Ave. Officers responded and assisted with their corralling until the cows came home.
- 10:00 p.m. – A 26 year old Milwaukee resident who does not possess a valid license was arrested for OWI – 1st Offense after being pulled over near the intersection of Racine Ave. and College Ave. They cover that whole no drinking and driving thing in drivers ed., but you didn't go, so I guess the obvious isn't so obvious to you or you think the rules just don't apply. She was processed and later released to a sober friend.
- 11:22 p.m. – A 53 year old resident of the W18400 block of Jean Drive called the police department to report four yoots were rummaging through open vehicles outside his residence. The rummaging was captured via our caller's surveillance cameras 7 minutes prior to him calling us. The yoots were last seen heading west on Jean Drive. An officer responded to check the area, however was unable to locate the little thieves.

August 31st:

- 3:03 a.m. – An oven spontaneously started on fire inside a residence located in the S8400 block of Racine Ave. The 46 year old caller reported large amounts of smoke coming from the appliance even though it had not been turned on. T.C.F.D. responded and did their thing after which everyone was able to go back to bed.
- 7:38 a.m. – A 49 year old resident of the S7700 block of Stags Leap Ct. called the police department to report his flag-donning mailbox had been intentionally damaged overnight. An officer responded to photograph the damage. Investigation continuing.

- 7:59 a.m. – A Muskego resident called the police department to report a reckless driver operating south on Racine Ave. from Tans Drive. The vehicle was seen attempting to pass on the gravel shoulder, ultimately lost control and entered the ditch near Williams Drive, then nearly struck a pedestrian walking their dog before regaining control and re-entering the roadway. Our caller followed the vehicle to Mercury Drive where it pulled over and the operator exited, seemingly to confront our caller. She quickly sped away fearing the 30 year old Milwaukee resident may have a weapon. Officers later located the suspect vehicle and operator at a business located in the W18800 block of Saturn Drive. He was unarmed and claimed he was just trying to get to work on time, however was in possession of drug paraphernalia, so he was cited for that along with his reckless driving.
- 9:15 a.m. – Another damaged mailbox with no one taking responsibility for their actions. This time a 51 year old resident of the S8600 block of Nature Ct. was victimized.
- 12:04 p.m. – A 66 year old resident of the S7000 block of Wildwood Drive responded to the police department to report fraudulent activity in his bank accounts. A detective was summoned and investigation revealed the complainant had not suffered a monetary loss. He was provided with instructions on how to re-secure his accounts.
- 12:07 p.m. – Husband forgot to tell wife he called for a landscaping estimate, so when the business employee was seen by wife walking, from her perspective, randomly through their yard, the 57 year old resident of the W18400 block of Jean Drive was concerned enough to call the police department. An officer responded and made contact with the employee and the truth was revealed; minds put to ease.
- 12:41 p.m. – Officers responded to the S10600 block of S. 124th Street for the report of a suspicious vehicle parked facing the wrong direction on the side of the road. An officer responded and made contact with a 23 year old Californian who was fishing...at the retention ponds...outside the landfill. Dude. Landfill employees advised that no one was allowed on the private property let alone given permission to fish from the God only knows infested water. It sounds like the business manager followed the suspect to their car, so we should have some decent photos to work with. Investigation continuing.
- 5:45 p.m. – A 29 year old now former resident of the W18400 block of Jean Drive called the police department requesting officers assist her in gaining access to her mother's residence that she was recently kicked out of in order to collect her belongings. An officer responded and contact was made with both parties who were advised of the civil matter and to call back if an escort was needed for an agreed upon date and time. Tough love.

- 6:29 p.m. – A 65 year old Racine resident called the police department to report being physically assaulted one day prior while participating in a political parade within city limits. The victim stated the occupants of a red, Chevrolet Supercrew pickup truck pulled in front of his vehicle during the parade, forcing him to stop. Two occupants exited and one approached the victim who subsequently exited his vehicle to yell at the operator for cutting him off. The operator then hit the victim in the side of his face with what our victim thought was a fist, knocking him down to the ground. The victim described both subjects as white, males in their mid-30s, a little over 6 feet in height, one 180 lbs. with curly short hair, and the other that struck him approximately 230 lbs. and wearing a baseball cap. The suspects then left the area in their truck. Another parade participant reportedly stopped and helped the victim off the ground and back into his car after which he immediately drove home. Upon arriving home, the victim stated his wife took him to an area hospital to receive treatment for the injuries he sustained. As of now, the identity of the attackers and good Samaritan are still unknown. The investigation is continuing.
- 7:41 p.m. – A 56 year old resident of the S8900 block of Creekside Ct. called the police department to report being in a verbal altercation with her husband who was scaring her. She indicated he had not threatened her nor did he have access to any weapons. Officers responded and made contact with both parties. The verbal nature of the altercation was confirmed, both parties were counseled on their behavior, and they agreed to remain separated for the remainder of the evening.
- 10:12 p.m. – A 16 year old Stallis resident thought he would impress his friends by driving past a traffic stop and yelling expletives at the officers conducting business. Fortunately for us, we had another officer close by who was able to track down this Rocky Mountain canary and pull him over after he was seen speeding and rolling through a stop sign at the intersection of Durham Drive and North Cape Rd. As previously mentioned, he's 16, so he wasn't supposed to have multiple occupants in the truck with him. He was issued a citation for the driver's license restriction violation, rolling through the stop sign, and given a stern talking to reference his choice of words. His big brother stopped by and picked them all up. You punks can all stay in your respective cities if you can't behave in ours.

September 1st:

- 7:04 a.m. – Officers responded to the S9200 block of Ravine Ave. for a four-player game of bumper cars. A 19 year old Wind Lake resident was the only operator that didn't see traffic slowing/stopping in front of her. She ran into the vehicle directly in front of her starting the chain reaction. No injuries were reported. Tows responded and she was issued a citation for following too closely along with compliance orders for proof of insurance and a registration violation.
- 8:46 a.m. – A 69 year old resident of the S8700 block of Racine Ave. responded to the police department to report several signs in her front yard had been spray painted overnight, apparently by someone in favor of socialism as that's what they decided to circle. - 9:29 a.m. – A 58 year old resident of the S8900 block of Creekside Ct. responded to the police department to report listing furniture for sale on Craigslist and being contacted by an interested party who was willing to pay \$80 over asking price. Nice! The buyer then informed our complainant that he would be sending movers to his residence to pick up the furniture and requested the additional money be given to them. Our complainant found this suspicious, because it is, and requested officer presence when the movers arrived. A detective was summoned and informed our furniture seller that this is most likely a scam and to use our front lobby as an internet purchase exchange location.
- 1:47 p.m. – Some underground drilling led to a pretty substantial gas leak in the S7100 block of Hillview Drive. Homes east of Richdorf Drive and half way down Hillside Drive had to be evacuated while crews ripped up the roadway in an attempt to find the source. Students leaving Mill Valley were rerouted after school and WE Energies responded to aide in the repairs.
- 4:30 p.m. – A 25 year old resident of the W17600 block of Harbor Circle forgot to pay for his gas after filling up at a business located in the W17800 block of Janesville Rd. Officers were able to make phone contact and the business called back later indicating things were squared up.

- 5:56 p.m. – A 66 year old resident of the S8600 block of Nature Ct. called the police department to report his neighbor consistently leaves grass clippings in the roadway and is fearful for motorcyclists' safety. It's also against municipal ordinance. An officer responded and made contact with the 68 year old neighbor on Nature Drive who agreed to keep his clippings out of the road.

An officer was summoned and contact was made with both parties who were advised not to saying anything at all if they couldn't say something nice to one another.

September 2nd:

The driver responded to the police department around 2:30 p.m. later that day and spoke with an officer claiming he was lost and only asking for directions to a nearby baseball field. I'm sorry, but if I'm lost, I'm not stopping to ask a 13 year old for directions.
- 10:12 a.m. – An 18 year old Greendale resident was cited for speeding, OAS, and advised not to drive following a traffic stop that occurred near the intersection of STH 36 and Champions Drive.
- 1:12 p.m. – A Burlington based trucking company was cited just over \$2,500.00 when their driver was pulled over near the intersection of Kelsey Drive and North Shore Drive for a weight limit violation. They were also issued a 15-day compliance order for failing to display the proper registration.

Our complainant felt the email was suspicious, so he called the other company directly and they informed him that they in fact were not interested in buying anything from him. Contact was made with an employee who provided video surveillance depicting the suspects and incidents. Investigation continuing.
- 2:30 p.m. – While investigating the gum thieves, the detective was also made privy to a perpetual steak thief. On four separate occasions, a white, male subject entered the store and stole in excess of \$100 worth of steaks. Check out the Facebook post for photographs and further details.
- 3:47 p.m. – A 70 year old East Troy resident was cited for reckless driving and possessing open intoxicants inside his vehicle that we pulled over near the intersection of Tans Dr. and Hillendale Dr. Officers were tipped off while providing traffic control by a school district employee who noticed the containers inside the subject's vehicle. The subject was checked for levels of intoxication, found to be borderline, and later picked up on scene by a sober party. I sure hope he wasn't planning on picking up any children!

No injuries were reported and an accident report was completed.
- 9:28 a.m. – A 79 year old resident of the W13700 block of Fleetwood Rd. called the police department to report his vehicle was stolen from his garage overnight. An officer was summoned to gather further information. The vehicle was entered into the database as stolen. Investigation continuing. #9PMROUTINE, use it folks!
- 11:32 a.m. – A 54 year old resident of the S7800 block of Parkland Drive called the police department to report his mailbox was damaged overnight. Our caller believed the damage was done intentionally due to the political signs in his yard. That's probably a safe bet. An officer responded to photograph the damage and in doing so came across another damaged mailbox at a separate residence. Investigations continuing.
